The 2010-11 Churchill Fellows Association of Queensland (CFAQ) annual cycle has re-started, and is now well underway!

Over 160 Queensland applications were received from aspirant Winston Churchill Memorial Trust (WCMT) Fellows in 2010. The WCMT Regional Selection Committee has completed the mammoth task of assessment and short-listing. Thirty-one applicants were interviewed over the ANZAC Day weekend (April 2010) and a final 'recommendation list' has been forwarded to Canberra. We await the final deliberations with interest!

The CFAQ Annual General Meeting (AGM) was held at the State Library of Queensland on Thursday 29 April 2010. There was a big turn out - to socialise by the river in the twilight, to manage the business of the CFAQ. ## **Reminiscences – Robyn Potter**

When Sir Winston Churchill died in 1965, I was one of the millions of Australians who watched his State Funeral on grainy black and white TV. London was still at the heart of the British Empire and, as a first generation "baby boomer" I was very conscious of the history of World War II and its impact on my family, and the families of my school friends. Churchill was a very "real" presence in our conversation and our study of history.

So, as a very junior articled clerk in Sydney, I was sent on messages in 1965 to deliver letters to prominent members of the legal community, asking them to make donations to a new Trust which was to be set up, as requested by Sir Winston in his Will, to support the education of people in the Commonwealth who could enrich their community by the practical application of their skills. Churchill's vision was to create a new "army" in the Commonwealth of young people with vision who could help to make a better world. I think his vision has been realized!

I never thought I would become a Churchill Fellow. It happened almost by chance, I was negotiating land use agreements with Aboriginal communities and mining companies which were a consequence of the High Court's Decision in the landmark Mabo case and the Native Title Act. We were not well informed in Australia about how to fulfil these new legal obligations, so I went to Canada and the USA to see how those countries had negotiated Treaties and Agreements with their indigenous people. It was a marvellous learning experience and I thought I should give something back to the Churchill Trust.

I first started as a Volunteer "minder" of the applicants for Fellowships. You will all remember how nerve-wracking that interview process is - it always seems to occur on a chilly, gloomy day and the applicants are usually pretty nervous. It

was so enjoyable meeting these enthusiastic and dedicated people - and, later, hearing about their travels and experiences as Fellows.

Then I progressed to various jobs on the CFAQ committee which, during my eight years' participation, has been a real source of inspiration. All the committee members I have worked with have been busy people in their own lives and a great example of the "can do" Churchill approach. I helped to organise the very successful National Conference that Queensland hosted in 2006. It required an enormous planning exercise, and the participation of many Fellows who hosted events and arranged visits and lectures at their workplaces.

Nothing that is organised, including the Selection of Fellows, their presentation to the Governor, the very large Annual Dinner and social events, happens by chance. It takes a lot of work, and I encourage young Fellows to become involved. If the Fellowship is to prosper and provide wonderful opportunities to future generations of Australians - YOU must take up the baton. It will be incredibly rewarding and stimulating and you will be privileged to meet so many of your fellow Australians from such diverse backgrounds that you will hardly notice the time passing. I have loved it and I wish the present and future Committees lots of success - they deserve it!!

## Returning New Churchill Fellows

### 2009 Heritage Buildings and Sustainability

**To study international approaches to the relationship between heritage conservation and sustainability—in particular to research the current policy positions of key government and non-government heritage organisations, and to investigate leading environmental rating tools and systems and how they address heritage buildings.**

The relationship between heritage conservation and sustainability is the subject of a great deal of research and policy development internationally. There is an increasing level of public interest in sustainability and what role the conservation of heritage buildings can play in achieving sustainable development.

Heritage organisations in particular accept that conserving heritage buildings can make an important contribution to environmental, social and economic sustainability.

My fellowship was undertaken between 21 September and 6 November 2009. The objective was to visit a number of government and non-government organisations in Canada, the UK and the USA to study the relationship between heritage conservation and sustainability. In particular, to research the current thinking and policy positions of key government and non-government heritage organisations with regard to sustainability and heritage conservation, and to investigate leading environmental rating tools and systems and how they address heritage buildings. This fellowship also enabled me to attend the following conferences:

- Heritage Canada Foundation Annual Conference *The Heritage Imperative: Old Buildings in an Age of Environmental Crisis* 24-26 September 2009, Toronto, Canada; and
- Association for Preservation Technology International Annual Conference *Preservation in the City Without Limits* 2-6 November 2009, Los Angeles, USA.

My fellowship provided me with the opportunity to visit and learn from some of the leading heritage organisations and practitioners in the UK and North America.

On completion of my fellowship, my principal observations were that:

- the environmental merit of retaining and conserving older buildings, including heritage buildings, may seem obvious however it appears to be difficult to prove without access to the appropriate data and tools;
- indicators, measurement and scientific data are important in the sustainability field, and heritage conservation is traditionally weak in scientific data and measurement;
- there are significant gaps in existing green rating tools which do not address social and cultural indicators of sustainability—including the consideration of durability, embodied energy and life cycle analysis. The inclusion of social and cultural metrics would acknowledge heritage conservation as a sustainable action; and

- decisions about whether to keep or demolish a building often revolve only around cost considerations without taking account of the environmental implications. There is a need to quantify the avoided environmental impact—the potential environmental gains available with keeping and renovating a building versus demolishing and building new. Environmental impacts can then be brought into the decision making process along with costs and other considerations.

I found the entire fellowship a wonderful and invaluable experience. I greatly appreciated the assistance and guidance I received from the Winston Churchill Memorial Trust throughout the fellowship, and from the CFAQ Committee during the interview process and fellow's dinner. In recognition of this, I assisted with the interviews this year and have also recently joined the CFAQ Committee. I found it fascinating to meet some of this year's candidates and to learn about their areas of expertise.

A highlight of my fellowship was spending a week with Historic Scotland, visiting some of its key properties and gaining an insight into its research programme. Other highlights included visiting outstanding heritage places in Canada, the UK and the USA, including private tours of Frank Lloyd Wright's Dana-Thomas House in Springfield Illinois, and Richard Neutra's Kaufmann House in Palm Springs, California.

Following my fellowship, I travelled to South America and spent a month touring Bolivia and Peru—and am very proud of myself for completing the Inca Trail trek to Machu Picchu.

I completed my fellowship report in February 2010 and now am actively pursuing the report's recommendations—and am pleased to report that I am having some success.

## ***Comment from Churchill House***

I have previously commented on what is being planned for the 50th Anniversary of the Trust which falls on 12 April 2015 and I promised I would keep you up to date.

This Anniversary is clearly a significant one and would be ideal for the release of an historical account of the Trust and what has been achieved for the benefit of Australia. By 2015, the Trust will have been in operation for 50 years and will have likely awarded over 4,000 Fellowships (now nearly 3,400). It is, therefore, timely that in 2015 a definitive history of the Trust should be published.

The Anniversary need not be celebrated on 12 April 2015. A more appropriate day in 2015 could be selected. For example, it might coincide with the release of the names of the 2015 Fellows. As well as the Anniversary being a milestone, there is also a responsibility for the Trust to ensure the history is well documented from a legacy perspective for the Australian people.

The history of the Churchill Trust is inarguably unique and is an account over a fifty year period of the topics and areas that were of most interest and concern to Australians for which Fellowships were then subsequently awarded. However, for the historical account to have wide appeal it must be more than a 'victory' lap of what has been achieved by individual Churchill Fellows and probably a thematic approach is more appropriate.

The primary purpose of the history is to obtain a sense of the stories of the Churchill Fellows and the impact the Fellowship has had on their lives and on Australia. The project could also capture the accounts of those who are not Churchill Fellows but who have played a pivotal and important role in the history of the Trust over a long period of time. This includes those who took part in the initial fund-raising campaign, those who served on the Board, those who served on selection panels and committees, and those who funded sponsored Fellowships and contributed financially to the Trust. The fortunes of the Trust from an investment, profile and future perspective could also be addressed. An underpinning theme might be developed to make the account of the Trust's history more appealing. For example, why has the Trust been such a successful institution from the time of the initial fund-raising to the present day? Suggested titles for the fifty year project include:

- *'Growing Australia; The Winston Churchill Memorial Trust, 1965 to 2015'*, or
- *'A Success Story; The Winston Churchill Memorial Trust, 1965 to 2015'*.

Despite the impact of the electronic age, a hard copy book is probably still needed as the end product although a book is not the only method of chronicling the Trust's history. Publication using the internet is gaining popularity, especially the developing 'e-book' format. This format has an appeal especially to younger Australians. The history (or an abbreviated version) could also be included on the Trust's website although this would markedly reduce the potential for any hard copy sales.

Two books already exist which provide an excellent foundation for the fifty year history. Both books are by Margaret Auchmuty. The first is; *'A Perpetual Trust: The Story of The Winston Churchill Memorial Trust Travelling Fellowships'*. This book covers the first two decades spanning the formation and first years of the Churchill Trust. The second is; *'Churchill Fellows of Australia 1966-1977'*. This book provides an account of the Trust's stewardship over the first 12 years of its operation by collating, classifying and analysing the study projects of the Churchill Fellows. A thematic approach has been taken in this book.

There are two possible methods for writing of the history of the Trust. Firstly, to approach a publishing house to see if they are prepared to fund a professional historian to write the history, or secondly, for the Trust itself to fund an author to write the history. The first approach would probably see the history handled in such a way to achieve the best possible sales result. The cost to the Trust would be minimal. The second approach would see the control of the history remain with the Trust but the Trust would need to fund the project. However, unless the author is already established and well known a publishing house would be unlikely to fund an author to write the history of the Trust.

The most likely option for the Trust is to engage a professional historian to write the history. The Trust would then have a manuscript for publication at the end of this process. This will involve the Trust advertising the project to seek expressions of interest from suitable professional historians/journalists/commercial authors. The project may also be of interest to a suitable Churchill Fellow. The greatest challenge for the Trust is to find the 'right' person. There is no doubt that the project would be very attractive for some, especially a younger professional historian who is seeking to enhance their profile.

It is unlikely that the history will result in a 'best-seller' and a print run of 3,000 would probably be the maximum. However, if books of this nature sell about 2,000 copies the project then becomes financially attractive for a commercial publisher. To ensure a publishing house is attracted to the proposal some guaranteed sales before publication would assist enormously. One strategy could be for the Trust itself to commit to a purchase of say 200 copies and if 800 Churchill Fellows also commit to purchasing the book, a guaranteed sale of 1,000 would probably be sufficient for a publishing house to undertake the editing and printing.

I would very much appreciate any suggestions from Churchill Fellows on what is proposed for this anniversary commemoration and how we are planning to approach this task. CFA's may also have a view on how to celebrate this upcoming milestone.

The CFAQ 2009 Annual General Meeting (AGM) was held at the State Library of Queensland on Wednesday 29 April 2009. There was a big turn out - to socialise by the river in the twilight, to manage the business of the CFAQ, and most especially to watch an inspiring documentary of Rhyl Hinwood's life and work as an eminent sculptor. The AGM business was quickly over with a review of the preceding year's activities (2008-09) and the election of a new and larger Committee - with the intention of spreading the work-load and fostering succession planning.

Over 200 Queensland applications were received from aspirant Winston Churchill Memorial Trust (WCMT) Fellows in 2009. The WCMT Regional Selection Committee (chaired by Justice Margaret White) completed the mammoth task of assessment, short-listing and a weekend of interviews

Congratulations to the nineteen successful applicants for WCMT Fellowships in 2009 – most of whom have departed for far shores, and subsequently returned, still afire from the magic of the experience. There were strong themes in 2009 in regard to managing and responding to environmental change; better protecting children, animals and plants at risk; and advancement of the Arts. The Governor Ms Penelope Wensley AO presented the awards to this newest generation of Queensland Fellows at Government House on the afternoon of Friday 7 August 2009.

The CFAQ Annual Dinner was held that evening in the Parliamentary Annex (Brisbane). Feedback from Fellows was very positive, with a full room and a large turnout of almost 200. We had the great pleasure of hosting Ms Louise Stenhouse and her partner (our colleagues from the WCMT), our various Sponsors, and members of the Queensland Selection Committee at the event. It can be noted with pride that we had twenty-four 'WCMT Medallion' recipients acknowledged on the night. The evening was made even more memorable by the musical interlude provided by Alexis Kenny (*2007 Advanced Flute*) and Irit Silver (*2009 Orchestral Leadership*) on their instruments of wind.
